

DID YOU KNOW?

The Life of St. Paul the Apostle

Saul (Paul) was born circa 5 AD in Tarsus. He was also born a Roman citizen. Saul moved to Jerusalem and studied under Gamaliel, a Pharisee and an esteemed rabbi. His deep beliefs in Yahweh led him to believe that Jesus was an imposter and a liar and he viewed Christians as deceitful and a threat to Judaism. He terrorized Jesus' followers to stop what

he believed was a false message. His hostility to believers in Jesus including putting them to death. Saul was present when Stephen, a follower of Jesus, was stoned thus becoming the first Christian martyr.


On his way to Damascus, Jesus intervened and would forever change Saul's life: "As he neared Damascus on his journey, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. He fell to the ground and heard a voice say to him, 'Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?' 'Who are you, Lord?' Saul asked. 'I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting,' he replied. 'Now get up and go into the city, and you will be told what you must do.' Saul got up from the ground, but when he opened his eyes, he could see nothing." (Acts 9:3-6, 8-9). His companions took him to Ananias, a believer, who with God's help, healed him. For Saul, both a physical healing and spiritual renewal took place. When he was healed the scales fell off his eyes and he became baptized.

Saul, now known as Paul, became one of the most influential apostles and believers in the history of Christianity. He was called to follow Jesus in a bold way; to spread the Gospel to the Gentiles. He founded churches, wrote letters, and led a ministry in which many men and women were part of spreading the Gospel. He travelled throughout what is now Turkey and Syria ending up in Rome.

He was eventually imprisoned, sentenced to death and was martyred for Christ in Rome.




***We are unable to take clothes, shoes, large pieces of furniture, televisions, computers, printers (no electronics), paints or books.

- 2. Making reservations is not required as there are several tables. However, if there is enough interest, you can reserve as many tables as you want. The rate for 2-4 players at a table is \$16.50/hr. You can enjoy soft drinks, beer, hot dogs, etc. while playing your game.
- 3. If you don't want to play pool, they also have <u>Foos Ball</u>, <u>Air Hockey</u> and <u>Ping Pong</u> on the premises at \$15.75 \$17.50/hr.
- 4. Free 2-hour parking before 6 PM and free parking after 6 PM.
- 5. For our Card Games in the Parish Lounge, consider playing other games as well (i.e. Darts, Scrabble, Back Gammon, Chess) plus invite other parishioners or friends to participate.
